The attention of electors and others concerned is called to the following sections of the Revised Code in relation to the sale of intoxicating liquors on the day of the election:

All places for retailing liquors in the several counties in the State shall be closed, and no intoxicating liquors allowed to be sold, bartered or given away, or drunk at any store, tavern, saloon, restaurant, steamboat, not running, wharf, boat at a landing, place of business thereof, in, from 12 o'clock of the preceding night to 12 o'clock of the succeeding night of general or special election, and all intoxicated rioters or disorderly persons discovered during the hours of the election in the city, town or place, where the election shall be held, shall be arrested, placed in jail, or otherwise kept in custody, (being permitted while in custody to vote), until the polls shall be duly closed, when they shall be entirely sober, quiet, orderly, peaceable and well behaved, and the Commissioners and Inspectors of Election are hereby made conservators of the peace of the districts and precincts, and all political officers appointed to guard or be present at the polls and the place of election, city marshals, their deputies, and all other police and peace officers are required to faithfully execute these provisions and others to preserve the peace, freedom and purity of elections, under the penalty prescribed in the penal code for any neglect of such duties, and said Commissioners or Inspectors shall, when necessary, call upon any and all citizens to aid them in these requirements, and all persons informed of any neglect or violation of these requirements shall give notice to the District Attorney and other proper officers thereof.

Attention is further called to the fact that the said election will take place in accordance with the Election Ordinance of the Constitution of the State recently adopted, and that cards of instruction for the guidance of voters and the official
