A Good Citizen Gone.

Canton lost a valuable citizen in the death of Mr. W. J. Mosby, Sr., Monday morning, March 18, 1907. Although Mr. Mosby had been in failing health for some years, his death came somewhat as a shock. Mr. Mosby was born seventy-five years ago in Rutherford county, Tenn. He came to Canton when a boy, entering Priestley & Mosby's drug store in the '50's. He remained with them and their successor until 1862. Then came the war between the States, and he followed that eventful war serving with distinction as lieutenant in Capt. Hugh Love's Company. He was severely wounded at the battle of Mansfieldville, Ky. Upon the cessation of hostilities he returned to Canton and engaged in the drug business on his own account, which he continued up to the time of his death.

He was a fine business man, painstaking and honorable in all his business transactions. He numbered his friends among all classes, and he never forgot a friend. Men of his quality are so rare that no community can dispense with them without feeling that it has suffered an irreparable loss.

Mr. Mosby is survived by a wife, two children, Mrs. James Magruder of Spartanburg, S. C., and Mr. W. J. Mosby, Jr., of this city, a sister, Miss Mat Mosby, who lived with him, a little granddaughter and two little grandsons.

The funeral took place from the Presbyterian Church Tuesday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, Rev. C. S. Newman conducting the last sad rites.

The closing of every place of business during the progress of the funeral, but truthfully attested the high esteem in which he was regarded.

To his loving and devoted wife, son and daughter and other relatives, in this hour of intense grief and sorrow, the deep sympathy of many friends is extended.

A Sudden Death.

The telegram which brought the news last Saturday of the death of Mr. Andrew J. Baldwin at 4 o'clock that morning was a shock that was received with deep regret by the relatives and many friends in Canton of this highly esteemed man.

With his brother, Mr. O. H. Baldwin, who was to undergo a surgical operation, Mr. Baldwin had gone to New Orleans only a short time before. It is particularly touching that death claimed him so unexpectedly, far from home and among strangers.

The remains arrived in Canton Sunday and were conveyed to Sbaron and laid to rest beside loved ones gone before in the cemetery.

Of a large family only two brothers survive him, Messrs. O. H. and W. M. Baldwin of this city.
