**MARKETS.**

**SATURDAY, Sept. 23, 1843.**

The transactions of the week, in all articles, have been limited in amount, as is common at this season, especially when it is supposed the fever prevails in our city. Our principal staples are not present in quantities to attract purchasers, and the upper rivers being at the low stage usual at this period of the year, produce does not arrive in larger quantities than are sufficient for local consumption. The fever still progresses in about the same ratio that we have noticed for several weeks—and while it cannot be pronounced an epidemic, yet there are a sufficient number of cases daily to prevent unacclimated discreet persons from entering the city from the surrounding country. This circumstance also tends to confine the business operations for the present to the wants of our local population. Every movement, however, that we have noticed, tends to the probability that the regular business of the fall will open, when the period arrives, on a sounder basis, and on a more extended scale, especially so far as merchandise is concerned, than we have been favored with for some years past.

Our receipts of cotton continue light, and our market is still but sparingly supplied.—The demand is improving, and prices, particularly of the better grades, say from fair up, are well maintained. The middling and good middling qualities have become more abundant, and have receded fully a quarter to a half a cent. Several small parcels of good middling cotton have changed hands within a day or two, at from 7 to 7 1/4c.

The sales of the week amount to about 2000 bales, about 300 of which were old. The annexed quotations are corrected.
