

States of Postage.
The following summary of the rates of postage under the law of March last, has been received from the Assistant Postmaster of the city of New York:
Letters not over half an ounce, not more than 3 miles, 5 cents; over 3 miles, 10 cents; over half an ounce and not more than an ounce, 10 cents. Any fraction over an ounce always counted as an ounce.
Ship Letters, delivered where received, 5 cents; conveyed by mail, 2 cents added to the usual postage—no letters deposited in a post office for less than 5 cents.
Circulars, and advertisements, one cent only; unsealed, any distance 3 cents; prepaid, 5 cents.
Newspapers, sent from the office of publication, not exceeding 100 square inches, under 400 miles, or within the State, one cent; over 400 miles, and out of the State, 1 1/2 cents; 100 square inches, the same rate as pamphlets. Transient newspapers the same rate, prepaid.
Pamphlets of all descriptions, not over one ounce, 24 cents a copy; for each additional ounce, 10 cents. A fraction less than a half ounce is not counted, if a half ounce or more, it is counted as an ounce.
Drop Letters, two cents. Letters advertised are charged the cost of advertising, not over four cents. Letter carriers in cities receive no letters not over two cents, on newspapers and pamphlets half a cent. See Letters one cent extra.
Foreign Postage.
Letters for the United States Territories on the Pacific, for a single half ounce or less, forty cents, prepaid or not. For Havana 124 cents, charged 30 cents, Panama 39 cents, prepaid.
The whole postage from any post office in the United States to or from Great Britain or Ireland, by American or English mail steamers, for a single half ounce or less, 24 cents, prepaid or not.
For Bremen, by American steamers, 24 cents, a single half ounce or less, prepaid or not, the usual inland postage to be added.
For other foreign countries, if sent by British steamers, United States inland postage, any distance, 8 cents a single half ounce, ten cents an ounce, prepaid.
If sent by American steamers, to go through the British mail, the whole postage is twenty-one cents a single half ounce, prepaid. If sent by American steamers, all letters for France, Holland, the Netherlands, and Spain; must be prepaid.
Sea postage for Newspapers and Pamphlets three cents, besides inland postage, both prepaid. But to or from Great Britain or Ireland, the total postage from any U. S. post office is on a newspaper two cents, and on a pamphlet one cent for each ounce or fractional excess, both prepaid. Sea postage on price currents, three cents, with inland postage added.
