## SOLDIERS ARE TO VOTE IN PRIMARY

RELATIVES AND FRIENDS ARE URGED TO SEND THEM LISTS OF CANDIDATES.

Holly Springs, Miss., May 1.—Relatives and friends of soldiers are urged to send them a list of candidates in the coming Mississippi Democratic primaries in order that they may avail themselves of the voting privilege in an open letter issued by S. W. Mullins, chairman of the State Democratic executive committee. The letter follows: To the Democrats of Mississippi: See that your relatives and friends in the military service have their opportunity to vote. The Legislature of Mississippi has provided a way for all qualified electors of the state who are in the military service of the United States to vote by mail in any primary election. The act requires each consecutive committee of each political party to meet on the first Monday in May of any year in which any primary election is held, for the purpose of making up a list of the candidates for the various offices to be voted for and for the purpose of having printed the blanks provided by the act to be used by the electors in military service in voting. The act provides that the county executive committee shall immediately mail the list of prospective candidates and sufficient number of blanks for voting to any elector in military service on the request of any candidate or individual furnishing the committee with the address of such elector. The act further provides that if a person in military service is otherwise a qualified elector the fact that he has not paid a poll does not disqualify him. On May 9, 1918, the Democratic executive committee of every county in Mississippi will meet at the court house and on that date you should request the committee in writing to mail the list of candidates and blanks for voting to your son, other relative or friend, furnishing the committee with his name and exact address.
