**John Robinson's Sad Fun.**  
John Robinson made New Year  
calls. He called on a saloon keep-  
er, he called for liquor, called the  
liquor good, and drank enough to  
trip him up. Then he called for  
police, and when the police came,  
he called them liars and such for.  
"I was having a little fun," he  
explained, winking at his honor.  
"John Robinson, are you aware  
that this is a very solemn world?"

**Congress.**  
The President has signed the bill  
providing for a return to specie  
payment in 1880. Butler again  
failed to get up the civil rights bill.  
It is generally supposed, that Con-  
gress will before adjournment re-  
port to some extreme legislation to-  
ward the South.  
The Congressional Investigating  
Committee have made their report  
upon Louisiana, and from it we  
clip the following:  
Without now referring to other  
instances, we are constrained to  
declare that the action of the re-  
turning board on the whole was  
arbitrary, unjust and in our opinion  
illegal, and that this arbitrary, un-  
just and illegal action alone pre-  
vented the return by the Board of  
a majority of conservative mem-  
bers to the lower house.  
Upon the general subject of the  
state of affairs in the South, and  
as to whether the alleged wrongs to  
colored citizens for political of-  
fenses are real, or were asserted  
without due foundation, the com-  
mittee took all proof offered as to  
wolves, and in most instances, and  
in addition they received all the  
testimony that was then on hand in  
New Orleans, offered by either  
party, as to the condition of affairs  
in other parts of the State."

**The London Times Alarmed.**  
London, Jan. 18.—The Times in  
an editorial on the gloom surround-  
ing us, says: "One thing is per-  
ceptible: all Germany is arming  
en masse, and the surrounding na-  
tions, including the best part of the  
world, cannot do otherwise. The  
momentary dreams of peace have  
fled away. Germany recognizes  
the stern necessity that what she  
won by arms, she can only hold by  
arms, and while arms are in her  
hands."  
The "soiled doves" in the Pacific  
Mail subsidy corruption fund have  
been discovered to be John G. Shu-  
maker (a Democrat) and Parsons  
(Republican), both members of  
Congress. They disbursed large  
sums, a considerable portion of  
which found its way into their own

tion fund.
