Postoffice Regulations

From the Postal laws and regulations, I respectfully refer the public to the following sections: Sec. 198. Each postoffice box or drawer, in all postoffices, is restricted to the use of one family, firm or company, and the rent therefor must be paid at least one quarter in advance.

OFFICE HOURS. From 8 to 12 a. m. and from 2 to 6 p. m. Sundays from 9 to 11 a. m. No Money Orders issued nor letters registered after 4 p. m., nor on Sundays.

Mr. Howard, U. S. Postal official, has been in Greenville during the past week, and has explained to us certain action of his that we introduced to his detriment in our statement of the Postoffice robbery here.

Second—He had formed his opinion of W. H. Bolton, as detailed to us, from information prior to our meeting.

Third—He did not send out for Bolton; he was not in at the time, and told the proprietor of the hotel, Habicht, to send out word to Bolton, who wanted to see him, that he was going away in the morning.

Fourth—Did not take charge of Brentlinger voluntarily, but at request of U. S. Marshal Lake.

Mr. Howard further states, that so far from his being a party to any job to exonerate Bolton from this transaction, that he stated in the United States court, in the presence of W. L. Sargent, Esq., the circumstances related in Brentlinger's testimony before the U. S. Commissioner, of Bolton's suggestion to him that the occasion of the fire was a good opportunity to settle the postoffice business, and to send the postoffice books out to him, and report them burnt.

In our writing up the facts of the postoffice robbery, we had no desire or design of assailing Mr. Howard; and all that was said concerning him was purely incidental, and from its connection with said transaction. We therefore have no disinclination to afford him the preceding explanation.

THE RIVER AND LEVEES.

Disastrous Break.

The river here appears to be responding to the decided fall above, or the various breaks; as a fall has set in. So far there is a decline of 24 inches.

On last Tuesday there was a disastrous break in front of Buck Ridge, the plantation of Messrs. Edmonds and Donaldson in lower Bolivar.

This is in the same vicinity that the breaks occurred in 1872 and 1873, and overflows and threatens the same country.

The water from this break escapes directly into Lake Bolivar and through to Deer Creek. The harm from this immediate break is limited to plantations north of Williams' Bayou, between Lake Bolivar and the river; but, as in the two said years, the protection of the northern portion of the county against water of the break, depends upon the levee on Deer Creek and Williams' Bayou.

The effect of this break will be very disastrous, unless there be a speedy and considerable decline in the river. Much of the country on Black Bayou between here and the Deer Creek Ridge will go under.

The break at Buck Ridge, from what we have heard of it, must have been the result of carelessness on the part of persons living in that vicinity. The attention of the levee officials was directed to the levees at Utopia, Shady Side and Gen. Clark's front; the real points of danger. No disaster was apprehended at Buck Ridge.

A Troublesome Word.

The good brother was tussling with the word "baptism." His pronunciation greeted harshly on brother Black's educated ear, and he arose to a point of order.

Rights of Married Women.

An Act entitled an act to properly construe the law with reference to the rights of married women.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Mississippi, That none of the provisions of the Revised Code of 1871, or of an act entitled an act to protect married women in the enjoyment of the fruits of their labor, approved April 18, 1874, nor of any other statute of this State, shall be so construed as to permit any married woman to contract with her husband so as to establish against him, in any manner whatever, any claim or demand for hire, services or labor performed by such married woman for or on account of her husband; and it shall not be lawful for any married man to contract with his wife, so as to have or maintain against the wife, in any manner whatever, any claim or demand for hire, services, or labor performed by such married man for or on account of his wife, and all contracts made between any husband and wife, in violation of this act, shall be absolutely null and void.

By limitation, February 15, 1876. The Board of Levee Commissioners met in session on Monday last; and adjourned on Tuesday, after the transaction of considerable routine business.
