

TUESDAY'S ELECTORS.

Charles Virginia—Baltimore Overwhelm—

The extent of Democratic victory in Virginia has gone beyond the most sanguine expectations. The majority is over 40,000 and Legislative gains are reported all over the State.

In Ohio Foraker is beaten beyond question. The balance of the ticket is in doubt. The Legislature also is probably Democratic. We quote from the dispatches:

Columbus, Nov. 6.—The Republican committee at 1 p. m. concedes the election of Mr. Campbell, and admit that the legislature is Democratic in both branches. Gov. Foraker has telegraphed his congratulations with as much cordiality as could be expected from a defeated candidate.

The Times Star, Republican, speaking of the result in Hamilton county says: "Foraker ran behind in a frightful way in this county. In the large German wards he was simply massacred. The Over The Rhine wards turned about face from the Republican column and swung into the Democratic line."

In Iowa it looks as though a Democratic Governor and, probably, Legislature had been elected. Chicago, Nov. 6.—A special dispatch from Des Moines, Ia., dated 3 a. m., to the Herald, Democrat, says: The Republican State Committee concedes the election of Boies by 5,000 to 8,000 plurality.

Massachusetts, Boston, Mass., Nov. 6.—Eleven towns are still to be heard from to complete the vote of the State. The total, with eleven towns lacking, is Brackett, Rep. 124,747; Russell, Dem. 118,202; Blackmer 14,229.

In referring to the speech of Senator George at Greenville, the N. O. Pleasants quotes him as advocating an educational qualification for suffrage. This is erroneous. The report of his speech published in the Times, and telegraphed to a number of papers, and accepted as accurate and authentic. In that report speaking of the race question his position was thus stated: "The contained the chief demand in his judgment, for a new Constitution; one framed by the white people of the State and secured by Constitutional provisions, white supremacy. In our judgment this stand is consistent and logical as well as wise. All who favor a convention agree as to the disease and that some treatment must be applied. The unwisdom of advancing individual views before the convention assemblies, is that it would beget dispute under which the certain necessity of action would be to a degree lost sight of; the tendency would be to intensify and broaden differences which if deferred to the convention itself, might be readily reconciled or accommodated by concessions and explanations.

It is to be noted that the only exceptions to Senator George's position are from those who oppose the convention per se; who have pronounced the case hopeless and say broadly that there is nothing which a State Constitution can do, to relieve the strain upon white supremacy. The issue between the two ideas is simply and sharply narrowed and fixed to convention or no convention; to those who believe that something can be achieved in the way of relief, and those who hold that the race evil admits of none which State power can exercise.

Respectfully, J. C. HEAD & CO. Killing of a Prominent Citizen. Memphis, Tenn., Nov. 7.—Col. W. C. Falkner, of Ripley, Miss., who was shot by his former partner, a Mr. Thurman, on Tuesday last died this morning from the effects of the wound. It seems from the various accounts received that he was talking to a number of gentlemen in front of Mr. Thurman's store last Tuesday when the old gentleman suddenly came out and drew a pistol.

Col. Falkner said "what do you mean?" Thurman made no reply and fired on him at once. The ball entered Col. Falkner's mouth, broke his jaw bone and ranged down his neck and remained there. All possible attention was given him, but one hemorrhage followed another, and death ensued at the time stated.

Col. Falkner is in jail at Ripley and his falling runs high. The physician who the projector and president of the Gulf railroad and Mr. Thurman was his partner in the scheme. The Col. bought out his partner's interest and made a handsome profit by the transaction. From this time on there seems to have been bad feelings between the men. Mr. Thurman drew a pistol on Col. Falkner once before; the colonel then open his coat and told him to shoot, as he was unarmed. The pistol was snapped several times without firing.
