We received a letter this week from Mr. Sam. K. Mayers, dated at Havana, Cuba. He is in Cuba on business connected with Dunn's Commercial Agency, and says he is enjoying good health.

Pihans and Rich were made the assignees, and will wind up the affairs of the concern. We learn the liabilities are between \$55,000 and \$60,000, with assets of about \$25,000 or \$30,000. We think that the policy will be for the assignees to run the concern and pay off the debts, thus saving the property from being sold at a sacrifice. We exceedingly regret to see this institution become so seriously involved, but as it has been making money, we believe the business will soon pay large dividends, and that there is money in such an enterprise.
