SOWING WHEAT.

1. TIME OF SOWING.—Nine times out of ten wheat sown early, say by the 1st of September, or later than the middle of October, is better than the late sowing.

2. PREPARATIONS OF LAND.—Clay soil, with a good coat of vegetable or animal deposit is best suited to the growth of wheat.

3. PREPARATION OF LAND.—Wheat should be washed before sowing and all defective grains separated, and there are many solutions in which farmers recommend the wheat to be soaked.
