SWEET AND IRISH POTATOES

Since present times are calling for economy along all lines, this week I'm giving you a few dishes made from sweet and Irish potatoes. Both foods cost only a few cents a pound and have much food value.

There are several very common and much used methods of preparing potatoes: such as sweet potatoes baked, candied, and made into custards and pies, Irish potatoes mashed, french fried, and made into potatoes salad.

ESCALLOPED POTATOES

Wash, pare, soak, and cut four medium-sized Irish potatoes in one fourth inch slices. Put a layer in buttered baking dish, sprinkle with salt and pepper, dredge with flour, and dot over with one tablespoon butter; repeat. Add hot milk until it may be seen through top layer. Bake until potatoes are soft.

PIMENTO POTATOES

Season three cups hot Irish potatoes with three tablespoon butter, one half cup cream, and salt to test. Beat vigorously five minutes, add one-half cup pimentos (cut in small pieces) and beat until well blended. Re heat and pile on a hot serving dish.

CREAMED IRISH POTATOES WITH EGGS

Cut two cups boiled Irish potatoes into cubes. Separate yolks from whites of four hard-boiled eggs. Chop the whites and force the yolk through a potato ricer or strainer. Add potato cubes and chopped whites to one and one half cups white sauce, and turn on a hot serving dish. Sprinkle with yolks and garnish with parsley.

BAKED POTATOES IN HALF SHELL

Bake six medium sized potatoes (sweet). Remove from oven, cut in half lengthwise, and scoop out inside. Mash, and add four table spoons butter, three table-spoon hot milk; then add whites of two eggs beaten stiff. Refill skins with mixture and bake from five to eight minutes in a very hot oven.

SPANISH POTATO CROQUETTES

Force hot-boiled Irish potatoes through a potato ricer over two cups. Add two tablespoon butter, yolks two eggs slightly beaten, and two table-spoons pimentos chopped until very fine. Season with salt and pepper. Shape, dip in beaten whole egg and roll in bread or cracker crumbs, fry in deep fat and drain on brown paper.

POTATOES AU GRATIN

Cut boiled Irish potatoes into thin slices or cubes; use about two cups. Mix one-third cup grated mild cheese and one-half cups white sauce and add to potatoes. Put in buttered baking dish, cover with three-fourth cup buttered cracker crumbs, and bake until crumbs are brown.

BROWNED SWEET POTATOES

Cut boiled sweet potatoes in one-fourth inch slices, arrange in baking pan, spread with softened butter, sprinkle with salt and paprika, and bake in a hot oven until well browned.

SWEET POTATOES WITH APPLES

Put one cup boiled sweet potatoes (cut in one fourth inch slices) in a buttered baking dish. Cover with three fourths cup pared and thinly sliced apples; sprinkle with one-fourth cup brown sugar, dot over with two table-spoons butter, and sprinkle with one half teaspoon salt, repeat. Bake in moderate oven one hour.
