

SENTENCE MINISTER TO THIRTY DAYS FOR STEALING

Chicago, Jan. 26. (ANP) When he was found guilty of stealing a watch from one of his "spiritualistic clients" Rev. Swetonic Layne, was sentenced to thirty days in the house of correction, here Tuesday morning by Judge Matthew D. Hartigan.

The charges were brought against the minister by Miss Clara Wharton, who told the court that she had gone to Rev. Layne's "Temple" at 3220 Indiana avenue, for a reading. The minister charged her \$1.50 and as she placed her coat on a chair she saw him extract her watch from the pocket. When she asked him to return it, at first he refused, and later made improper advances in return for her watch. The judge admonished the minister to "practice what he preached" and in order for him to know that "the way of the transgressor is hard" imposed the thirty days sentence upon him.

"HITLERISM" REVEALS RACIAL BIAS

New York, Jan. 26. (ANP) Hitler-dicus, one of the later books on the political situation in the German Republic, relates the hatred of Hitler for the Jews of Germany whom he proposed to run out of the country. Nordicus declares that the would be dictator of the fallen empire declares "the Jew has an especial grudge against the "white races." He was responsible for the Negro troops brought to the Rhine to contaminate the pure German stock; referring to the African troops of the French colonics. Hitler's aims, according to Nordicus, are first of all to keep Germany pure racially, second to drive all races other than pure Germans out of the country by legislation against them.

COLUMBUS, Ga. — (CNS) Economic considerations caused Elijah Thurman, an aged Negro, to apply to a local freight office here for a round trip rate to Chicago, for a corpse.

He explained, it was said, that relatives in Chicago wanted a last look at the deceased before burial here.

Thrifty heads of the far-separated family figured it far cheaper to transport the corpse in that manner, than to bring the distant relatives here for the final rites.

SEEK DEPUTY'S SLAYER

Columbia, Tenn., Jan. 26. (ANP) Several widders are scouring the densely wooded hills of the Enterprise community in a search for Someville Ridley, 25, who been named as the man who shot and killed Eugene Fleming, 49-years-old white deputy sheriff Friday afternoon.

Ridley and two friends are said to have been fixing their automobile when the deputy accosted them in a surly manner. Ridley was slow to speak up and words ensued between him and the officer. Both of them drew pistols, but Ridley's bullet reached home first. His companions are being held in jail while the search is conducted.

PHYSICIAN STABBED TO DEATH

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 26. (ANP) Dr. David C. Northeros, well known physician here was stabbed to death Tuesday, January 3, at 2201 St. Antoine street, by Morris Hayden, one of his tenant in Noraheros hotel. Dr. Northeros was entering the door of the room occupied by Hayden and was stabbed as he opened the door. Hayden claims the act was done in self-defense.

Dr. Northeros, who was the owner and operator of Mercy hospital on Winer street practiced in Detroit fifteen years, was also owner of Northeros hospital.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

LESSON FOR JANUARY 29th, 1933.

JESUS AND THE SABBATH

Young People's and Adult Topic The Lord's day Mark 2: 23-28; 3:1-8.

Golden Text "The sabbath was made for man, and not man for the sabbath; therefore the Son of man is Lord also of the sabbath". Mark 2:27-28.

Sunday is a day for rest, for worship, and for service to God, for man. Its proper use is a matter of stewardship the Stewardship of time. Those who regulate their observance of Sunday by a system of minute rules and regulations make the day a burden instead of a blessing.

Jesus spiritualized the Sabbath by declaring that it was made for man, and by declaring that he is the Lord of the Sabbath.

Spiritually withered hands are worse than physically withered ones; however, the Lord can heal them.

NOTES ON THE TEXT

Verse 23. The Jewish law demanded Sabbath observance, and the Pharisees sought to enforce it. The spirit of this law meant nothing to these self-righteous Pharisees, but they held firmly to the letter of it. As Christ had His disciples passed through the cornfield, the disciples began to pluck the ears of corn.

Verse 24. The disciples had dared to pluck the ears of corn on the Sabbath day and the Master had not reprimanded them.

Verse 25. Jesus as usual had an answer ready for His enemies. He Cites to them the occasion when David broke the law, when in his extremity he ate the shew-bread of the priests in the temple. It was unlawful for anyone to eat the shewbread, except the priests.

Verse 26. Jesus knew about this incident, concerning David, as it had been recorded in history. He also knew what regard David was held by the Pharisees.

Verse 27. Man was first created and he sabbath was given to subserve his highest good.

Verse 28. This statement is a declaration of Christ's supremacy over the Sabbath.

Verse 1. Another sabbath had come and Jesus, as was his custom, went into the synagogue. Doubtless the afflicted man came to the synagogue to ask alms of those who came.

Verse 2. The Pharisees watched Jesus to see if he would heal on the Sabbath day so that they could criticize him.

Verse 3. Jesus commanded the man to stand forth. The audience turned their attention from Jesus to the man, who stood before them.

Verse 4. Jesus turned His attention to those who criticized Him. He asked them a question. They certainly could not deny that it was right to do good on the Sabbath day.

Verse 5. Jesus was grieved for the hardness of their heart and He looked upon them with anger. He beheld how sinful and low a human being may fall.

Verse 6. The Pharisees joined hands with the Herodians, so that they might destroy Jesus, simply because they did not except His works of mercy.

HORRIBLE CONDITIONS ON LEVEE ARE REPORTED BY SCHUYLER AND WILKINS

New York City—(CNS)—George S. Schuyler and Roy Wilkins, two well-known newspaper men have just returned from a trip to the Mississippi delta region, where they found many cases of terrorism, oppression, and exploitation of Negro laborers, including forced prostitution and chain-gang sentences for Negro women in the territory controlled by the construction companies working on the flood control project in the delta district.

Disguised as laborers Schuyler and Wilkins spent three weeks investigating conditions in the delta region for the N. A. A. C. P., and gathered a vast amount of evidence supporting the charges of peonage in the flood control area.

Schuyler claims that he was robbed of \$30 by a Vickburg (Miss.) police officer, and locked up over night on suspicion. Wilkins join Schuyler in asserting that professional and business men are also caught in the net and that prostitution is even in higher circles.
