Buildings Destroyed in Greneda.

Granada, Miss., Aug. 16:--At 6:15 this evening the alarm of fire was sounded and everybedy rushed to and fro to find out where it was .-The fire eriginated in the furniture house of Garner & Co. on Main street, but how it is impossible to find out at this writing. The building was a large frame. There was a good breeze at the time and the Toppah County Democratic Executive fire spread rapidly in all directions. Going south it eaught S. H. Broster's saleon, and next deer was the ine livery stable owned by Meader of Co, and extensing to the corner destroyed Phenix Hall. On the north from whore it started the fire seen caught Mrs. Powell's millinery store, Hughes & Nance, druggists; T. Murry, T. O. Willis, The. White, McCord & Co., groceries, W. G. Hamilton, dry goods; Brannum & Goodwin, druggists; Griffis & Duncan, dry goods and greceries, and down Depot street, taking in E. F. Wolfe's saloon, O. J. Anetia & Co., dry goods, and the house owned by the Farmers' Mercantile Company. On the west side of the street, frem whence it commenced, it took in every building from Perguson's liv ery stable to Thomas Bros.' corner, a solid block, and including N. C. Snider & Son's, bankers. From thence it stretched west, taking in all the buildings on the west side of the square, reaching the corner of Green street, destroying the pest office and in the end burning every building on that row. Such a scene is seldom witnessed. The square is blockaded with goods, while houdreds of people are quistly looking en at the ravages of the devouring element without the least power to arrest them. Method for Putting up Fruit for New Orleans Exposition.

For sound hard fruit-Apples, Pears, Cherries, Plums, etc., take & alcohol and pure water. For soft take & alcohol and & pure water, put in jars keeping the jars well filled with the fruit and fluid, and under clese cover, set away in a dark, coel place, and examine frequently, removing any specimens which have become defective. Jars will be furnished to collectors as seen as we can possibly get them; in the meantime, use any jara you may have on hand, in order that no chase alcohol from local druggists en best terms you can, and send veucher to me at Madison Station, Miss., and the same will be paid.
