OHIO REFORMED MEDICAL COLLEGE.

The spring and summer course will be more appropriated to botany, materia medica, comparative anatomy, and clinical practice, &c.

There being an infirmary connected with the College, the students will have the benefit of Clinical Practice, by which the practical part of medicine will be acquired with the theory.

Every student on entering Worthington College, will become an honorary member of the Reformed Medical Society of the United States, from whom he will receive a Diploma, and an Annual Report of all the proceedings and discoveries of its different members, and be entitled to all its constitutional privileges and benefits.

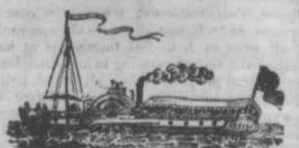
