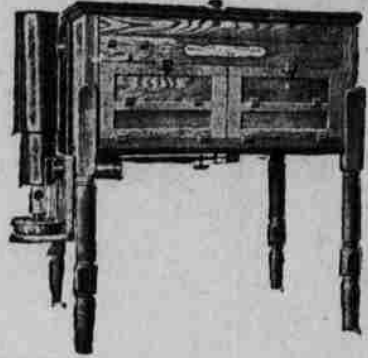

You will take notice that it is the intention of the Board of Supervisors of Noxubee county, Mississippi, at the next regular meeting to be held at the Court House in the City of Macon, on the first Monday in April, the same being the 1st day of April A. D. 1912, to make an order for the issuance and sale of road Bonds of the said Supervisors District of Noxubee County, Mississippi, as provided in Senate Bill No. 66, being an act of the Legislature of the state of Mississippi, approved March 23d, 1910 and entitled "An Act Authorizing the Board of Supervisors to Contract and maintain public roads in one or more Supervisors Districts of the various counties of the state, to issue bonds and levy taxes for that purpose, and to provide for the manner in which roads should be constructed and maintained, and how bonds shall be issued and taxes levied for that purpose." Which said bonds are proposed to be issued and sold for the purpose of building and maintaining such roads in said Supervisors District, as may either be decided upon to be built and maintained by the Board of Commissioners hereafter appointed by this Board, as in said act provided. All said bonds to be issued and sold and the proceeds used as in said act provided, and that in addition to using the proceeds of said bonds for the purpose of building and maintaining roads in such Third Supervisor's district, and that such part of the proceeds of the sale of said bonds, as such commissioners, shall, with the approval of the Board of Supervisors, be fit, to be used and expended to extend said roads into other districts.

That notice is given to that such qualified electors of such District as may desire, may petition against the issuance of said Bonds to this Board on or before the date of next regular meeting of this Board.

The undersigned citizens of Noxubee County, Mississippi, most respectfully present this their petition for the pardon of J. E. Finkele, and would show the following facts: That said J. E. Finkele, was indicted by the grand jury of Noxubee County on the 21st day of July, 1908, on a charge of burglary, and on the 27th day of February 1909, was convicted in the Circuit Court of said County and sentenced to the State Penitentiary for a term of five years at hard labor.

Your petitioners would further show that immediately upon the return of the indictment said Finkele was arrested, and because of his poverty was unable to give bond, and was placed in the County Jail, where he remained until he was conveyed to the penitentiary, where he now is.
