From Sunday's Paper.

The topic of discussion in the State press the past week has been the remarkable opinion delivered last week by Attorney-General Williams on the registration question. It has been shown that the Attorney-General's opinions are merely advisory they are not binding and in this deliverance this opinion was not even an official one. The Attorney-General must have realized that he had made a legal slip for he quickly gave counties which had ordered a new registration a "getting out place" by stating that old registrations could be used in the August election. But the feature of his ruling which attracted most discussion and criticism was his application of constitutional provisions to a primary. Hon. Robt. E. Mays, of Copiah county, in one of the clearest and most logical legal opinions we have read, shows conclusively the error of the Attorney-General's contention and Senator Noel, author of the primary law, is of the same opinion. In some counties the ruling caused the registrars to begin operations instanter, but in a great many counties the opinion was ignored. There seems to be no doubt but that citizens who are qualified electors in an election are qualified to vote in the primary to make nominations for that election and the party authorities in this State should so hold.

If one wants to realize the magnitude of the growth and development of Columbus a ride over the city will soon cause him to know what is going on. Sections which but a few years ago were open fields are now dotted with houses, laid out in streets and have become suburbs of this city. Columbus is growing in all directions, industrially, commercially, educationally, morally and is destined to become the greatest city in all this country.

The view expressed by THE DISPATCH that the ruling of the Attorney-General that a man had to be registered four months before the August primary to be qualified voter in that primary would force counties where new registration had been ordered to use the old registration books is borne out by the Attorney-General in an opinion given out the past week in which he states that it is the duty of the election commissioner to place on the poll books the names of all qualified electors whether they are registered on the old or the new registration. This will simplify the situation in this county very much, and save a large number of the people the necessity of re-registering.

Not only the candidates for Governor will be there, but all of the State candidates will be in attendance and Columbus will send her quota. Lieut. Gov. Harrison will go; Gen. J. H. Sharp will go, Mr. J. T. Senter will go and there will be many of their warm personal friends will accompany them. The Columbus delegation will leave in the morning and will return tomorrow night on the eleven o'clock train.

Mississippi Matters.

The citizens of Mount Olive met in mass meeting the past week and called upon Hon. M. M. Evans to become a candidate for the position of Lt. Governor. He has announced.

The meeting of the State Medical Association has been cancelled from Greenville to Vicksburg on account of the high water. The association meets on April 15th.

Mr. J. P. Carter, of Hattiesburg, Miss., has announced for the office of Lt. Governor. Mr. Carter has had extensive legislative experience, has a wide acquaintance over the State and is regarded as a formidable candidate.

Gen. Robert Lowry, commander of the Mississippi Division of the Confederate veterans, has appointed Maj. E. D. Cavett, of Macon, an aid on his staff. Mr. Cavett's friends in this section recognize his fitness for this position and congratulate him upon his appointment.

The Supreme Court of the State heard one of the most important cases which has ever come before it the past week. It involves the right of the State to tax the foreign loan companies doing business in this State. As the people know numerous syndicates have been loaning money in Mississippi and they have paid no tax or license. The revenue agent is endeavoring to tax these. The amount of money loaned in this State by these concerns is estimated at between ten and fifteen million dollars and the taxes on the same, if recoverable, will amount to between \$1,000,000 and \$1,500,000.

To Celebrate The 29th.

The lodges of Lowndes county will celebrate the anniversary of their order on Wednesday, the 29th of April. The celebration will be held this year at the same place it was held last year, at New Bethel church near Jemison's Mill, the plan to celebrate in this city being impracticable. The lodges from Columbus, Caladonia, New Hope and Artesia, the lodges from Gordo, Millport and the section east of us will join in this occasion and it is expected that lodges from the surrounding cities will also be present.

There will be a parade at New Bethel headed by the Columbus band, which will be in attendance and will discourse music for the occasion, while the anniversary exercise will be participated in by all of the lodges. The oration will be by Rev. T. W. Lewis, the eloquent and popular pastor of the First Methodist church of this city, who is a member of Union Lodge and who is a staunch Odd Fellow. There will be a basket dinner on the grounds and short speeches by a number of the representatives of the surrounding lodges.

Union Lodge, with their friends, will go to the scene of the celebration on a special train on the Southern carrying the Artesia lodge with them, the latter coming to this city on the early morning train. A splendid celebration and a delightful occasion is assured.
