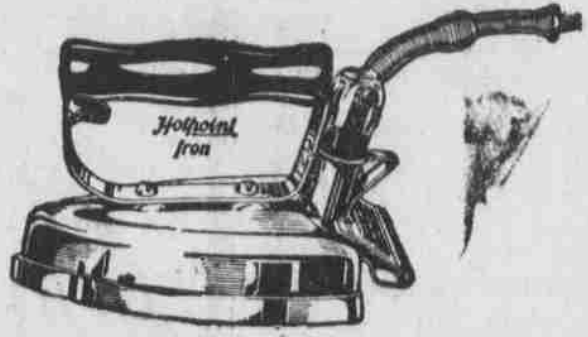

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS.

The League of Women Voters held their monthly meeting last Thursday afternoon. Owing to Prof. Burgin's illness, the announced lecture by the eminent scholar was not given.

Very interesting reports from Mrs. William Baldwin and Miss Ellen Crawford were heard. Mrs. Baldwin gave an account of the National Convention, which met in Cleveland, Ohio. Miss Crawford's report dealt with questions discussed in Jackson, where she represented Miss Eckford at the Executive Committee of the League of Women Voters, which met in Jackson at the same time the State Federation of Clubs convened there.

Among other things, Miss Crawford told of the contemplated summer work of the League, which expects to put on an extensive campaign for organization in which the National League will lend assistance, sending out a trained organizer, and otherwise directing the work.

The League urges its members to affiliate with party organizations, which in no wise conflict with the work of the League.
