**Senator McLaurin's Measure in
 Behalf of the I. I. & C. Pas-
 ses the Senate.**

Washington, D. C., Feb. 1.—
 Senator McLaurin called up today,
 in the Senate, his bill for the grant
 of a township of land to the Indus-
 trial Institute and College and the
 bill was passed without amend-
 ment. If this bill passes the
 House, as it is likely to do, it will
 be an endowment of more than
 \$3,000 acres of land for the female
 college of Mississippi.

Two bills were also introduced
 by Senator McLaurin to-day, one
 to pay ten thousand dollars to the
 Baptist church at Corinth, Miss.,
 and the other to pay two thousand
 five hundred dollars to the Metho-
 dist church at Brandon, Miss. The
 church houses of the congregations
 named were burned by the United
 States troops during the war and
 the bills introduced are intended
 to indemnify these churches for
 the losses sustained.

Mississippi Corn Crop.

Under the caption of "The Enor-
 mous Corn Crop," the Aber-
 deen Examiner says:
 "The estimate of the depart-
 ment of Agriculture of the Miss-
 sissippi crop of corn for this year
 though exceeding in ratio and
 bushels that of any other South-
 ern State, is far too small. Our
 crop for 1893 is reported at 26,-
 000,000 of bushels, and that of
 1894 at 36,000,000 and yet in almost
 every county in the State well
 informed farmers estimate the yield
 of corn at fully double that of last
 year, and as to quality, it has never
 been surpassed in uniformity
 and excellence. If Mississippi
 can repeat in 1895 the corn pro-
 ducing feat of 1894 her farmers
 will "have money to throw at the
 birds," and there is no reason why
 she should not.

Washington, Feb. 1, 1894.—The
 monthly statement of the director
 of the Mint shows coinage at the
 several mints during January,
 1895, as follows:
 Gold, \$3,968,300; silver, \$574,-
 000, minor coins, \$63,200. Of the
 silver coined \$200,000 was in sil-
 ver dollars. Since Jan. 1, 1894,
 the number of silver dollars coined
 was 3,293,978.
