**Attempt to Burglarize Store.**

Weathersby Bros. were considerably surprised when they came to open their store Wednesday morning to find that an attempt had been made during the night to burglarize it. The would-be burglar had bored ten holes, 1/2 inches in diameter, in the shutter of the east front window, directly over an iron bar that fastens the shutters and holds them together. The work was probably done with a brace and bit, which appears to have been dull, as only six of the holes penetrated the shutter, which is of a tolerable thickness. The holes were bored one above the other, and several inches apart, from right to left. An effort was made to cut the piece out between these holes, but enough had not been bored and the guilty gent was probably frightened away. His object was accomplished. Had he succeeded in making the opening it would have been an easy matter to have removed the bar and raised the sash. There are some marks on the outside of the shutters, probably made with a knife during the day, to indicate where the boring should be done. These marks could have been easily made by someone sitting, unobserved, on the stairway, which is built up the outer wall, "along-side-of" the window, as it were.
