**ADVOCATES OF DALY COUNTY UNITE UPON PLAN OF DIVISION**

**Highwood Left Out in Accord With Request of Delegates From That Town.**

 Belt, Jan. 11.—Advocates of Daly county held a harmonious meeting here this afternoon and it was decided by practically unanimous vote to push the plan to create a new county with all the vigor possible before the present session of the legislature.

Selection of the first roster of county officers was made with two exceptions and the committee in charge was authorized to make selections for those places and incorporate them in the list approved by the meeting. The meeting eliminated the only opposition that promised itself and after that had been done along friendly lines, the business of the day was transacted and everything was marked by the greatest harmony. Even the delegates who were dropped asked that they be not included, as the town of Highwood, from which they came, did not want to be included in a new county plan.

The meeting was attended by something like 300 delegates, including people from Waltham, Raynesford, Geyser, Armington and Highwood, and most of the delegates were farmers. The meeting was called to order by George W. Merkle, chairman of the county division committee of Belt, and S. A. Remington was chosen temporary secretary. Mr. Merkle explaining the work that had been done by the committee and its position on the proposition to create the new county division along general lines and set up what he considered arguments for the proposed division.

After the two addresses had been concluded the question was presented by motion as to whether further action should be taken, and it was agreed that the effort should be pressed in a measure before the present session of the legislature to get the new county.

The temporary officers were then made the officers of the permanent organization and the organization of the new county along temporary lines proceeded. A committee consisting of nine, the members being J. B. Buchanan, F. C. Josselyn, Matt Richardson, Fred Gustafson, J. Huber, Matt Shannon, R. H. Remis, Norman Parker and C. S. Morris, was named to select the first officers of the county. After an hour's deliberation they reported the following list as the officers agreed upon: Commissioners, David Dimperton of Corn Creek, L. C. McCoy of Spring Creek, and Aleids Fischer of Norbert; assessor, C. L. Crane of Armington; clerk of the court, Edgar L. Morris of Belt; clerk and recorder, A. A. Freeman of Geyser; county surveyor, Morris Anderson of Norbert; county superintendent of schools, Hazel Richardson of Belt; sheriff, W. H. Woods of Raynesford; public administrator, Fred Danielson of Monarch; state senator Charles Atkinson of Raynesford; representative in the legislature, Charles Holmberg of Box Elder; coroner, Dr. Arthur E. Chamberlain of Belt; county treasurer and county

**HAIL INSURANCE RESERVE PROPOSED TO PAY FULL LOSSES**

**Roundup Commercial Club Asks for Law to Avoid 1918 Situation.**

 Roundup, Jan. 11.—A plan whereby full state hail insurance may be paid farmers, who suffered heavy losses in last summer's storms, especially in Musselshell county, and combining a provision for the creation of a reserve fund for years when the ordinary revenues of the State Hail Insurance board may not suffice for the payment of losses in full, is to be proposed to the legislature by the Roundup commercial club.

The club, in resolutions recites that, owing to the unprecedented number of hail storms last summer, the many farmers who insured with the state as the safest kind of insurance, will receive only about 40 per cent of their insurance. It, therefore, proposes: "That legislation be enacted during the present session which will prevent a recurrence of this loss by our farmers, and that provision be made to set aside a fund from the surplus of following years to make good the shortage in this fund for 1918; and that such fund be collected from those insured in the
