RAIN FORECASTED BUT NOT PROMISED

Ira Myers, Well Known Pioneer, Says This Heat and Drouth in June Passes All Records.

It will rain about tomorrow or the day after. That may be a prophecy; it may be a guess. It is the statement of Ira Myers the well known pioneer. Mr. Myers admits that he doesn't know which it is and he says if it proves to be a prophecy he will be content to go unannounced just for the sake of having called the turn of the weatherman's card this time.

"Weather changes have been the most elusive things that ever came down the trail, this year," said Mr. Myers as he talked about the hot weather and the drouth yesterday. "I've been in the state more than half a century and not in all that time has there been a June that approached the present one for heat and drouth. There have been high marks in temperature, but they didn't come in June. There has been no time of the year that is as hot as the present at any time of the year."

"Many will say that this reminds them of the year so and so. Well, it stands in a class by itself, so far as I am concerned. I never saw one like it and it reminds me of the fact that it is going to be a mighty hard winter for hay if the drouth continues and even if it should rain day after tomorrow, the hay crop will be short. I recall one very dry year. It was far from as dry as this year, back in 1867. It was a dry winter and every day in January they sprinkled the streets in Helena, the dust was so bad. The following year there was a record of moisture. And so it has been other years of the past: one or two dry years and then a good crop year. It had been coming that I had begun to believe that was the rule for Montana. I would bet this would be a good crop year, and like the others, I would have been stung, as the boys say."

BILL FOR CANNON IS NUMBER 6142

Hungarians Ordered to Evacuate Slovakia

BUILDING OF FORTS WILL GIVE THE U. S. FORTIFIED FRONTIER

Washington, June 26.—Completion of forts and housing accommodations along the Mexican border, undertaken by the war department to ameliorate the trials of the troops serving as patrols, will give the United States its real fortified frontier.

Regularly established army posts along the international boundary now total more than two score, with probably as many more outpost positions, accommodating a troop of cavalry or an infantry platoon. The three year watch of the American troops by the war department finally to decide that permanent housing should be furnished.

The cost of this construction for the government has been small. Major General De Rosey Cavell, commanding the southern department, was authorized to visit the camps in his department which were to be abandoned and to claim any material needed. Entire buildings were transported to the border and re-erected by the troops. Only a very small quantity of new lumber and equipment was used.

Official maps just issued by the war department designate the following points as army posts: California—San Ysidor, Palm City, Compo, Tecate and Calexico, Arizona—Yuma, Ajo, Arivaco, Fort Nogales, Lochiel and Fort Douglas, Texas—El Paso, Fort Hancock, Hester's Ranch, Marfa, Candelaria, Evert's ranch, Ruidosa, Terlingua, Green Springs, Del Rio, Fort Clark, Eagle Pass, Indio ranch, Delores mine, Laredo, Delores Zapata, Roma, Mission, Fort Ringgold, San Benito, Camp Mercedes, Harlington, Brownsville and Fort Brown.

Ince Offers \$50,000 to Airman Who Makes Trans-Pacific Flight

Hilo, Hawaii, June 14.—Stirred by the report that Thomas Ince, motion picture producer, has offered \$50,000 as a prize for the first aviator to reach Australia from California touching Hawaii, L. Barron, local banker, is raising by subscription a fund of \$5,000 which will be paid to aviators competing for the Ince prize if they first land in Hilo. More than half of the fund was subscribed in a few hours.

Former Greek King Is Broke; Ex-Kaiser Quits Putting Up

Paris, June 26.—(Havas).—Former King Constantine of Greece, who has been living in Switzerland, is in financial difficulties, according to advices from Geneva to Paris newspapers. Former Emperor William had been supplying the former Greek ruler with funds, but this subsidy has been cut off. It is added that Constantine is endeavoring to become reconciled with the present Greek government.

TWO THOUSAND ENEMY ALIENS ON TRANSPORT HEADED FOR GERMANY

Charleston, S. C., June 26.—The transport Martha Washington was lying in the harbor tonight with about 2,000 Germans aboard prepared to sail for Rotterdam tomorrow or Friday. The passengers include aliens arrested in all parts of the United States and interned for the period of the war.

Among the enemy aliens are understood to be Captain John Klattendorf and several of his officers from the former German steam freighter Leibensfels, which they sank in this harbor. They have served terms in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta.

Striking Shipbuilders Wreck Streetcars

Toledo, June 25.—More than 25,000 employes of the Toledo Shipbuilding company refusing to submit to an increase in street car fare, today, hitched two cars and in the violence that followed windows in two others were smashed with bricks. One of the cars that was turned over caught fire.

The Toledo Railway and Light company instituted a new fare rate today. The trouble at the shipyards started when the cars began to fill. The crew of the first car was forced off and one of the passengers ran the car to the Hocking Valley docks, where it was turned over.

Questions and Answers

Q. What is the definition of eligibility to membership in the American legion recently formed? S. A. P.
A. Any individual who served honorably in the army or navy of the United States between the date of our entrance into the war and the signing of the armistice, or who served in the armies of our allies at any time during the war, is eligible to membership in the American legion. This includes yeomen (f) and army and navy nurses.

Q. Is there any difference in the pay of a senator and a representative in congress? R. R.
A. There is no difference in their salary; each gets \$7,500 a year.

Q. Are men who have served in the war given any preference when they want to enter civil service? C. E. G.
A. Yes. A service man may pass a Civil Service examination with a mark of sixty-five, while others must get seventy. He may secure temporary appointment of three months prior to taking examinations. He is given preference in appointment over non-service applicants of the same rating. Physical requirements for specific positions for which he has taken vocational training are waived.

Q. Is it true that the presence of insects on mushrooms is a proof of their edibility? J. D.
A. According to the department of agriculture, this is not true. Insects infest the most poisonous as well as the most edible species of fungi.

Q. When did the first steamship cross the Atlantic? C. O. B.
A. One hundred years ago on the 22nd day of May of this year, the first steamship, the Savannah, sailed from the port for which it was named, reaching Liverpool 29 days and eleven hours later.

COEUR D'ALENE MINERS DEMANDS UP TO MEDIATOR.

Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, June 25.—Demands of miners of the Coeur d'Alene district were discussed at a conference here this afternoon between Robert M. McWade, federal mediator, and operators of mining properties.

The employes have asked for an eight-hour day, recognition of their union and a wage increase of 50 cents daily.

IN HIDING 13 YEARS ALLEGED MURDERER OF M'INTOSH IS CAPTURED

Government Had Spent \$50,000 in Futile Endeavor to Arrest This Indian.

Prince Rupert, B. C., June 26.—After eluding capture for 13 years Simon Gun-Noot, an Indian fugitive known in every part of British Columbia, has been delivered to the authorities and will stand trial for the murder of Alex McIntosh and Max Le Clair in June, 1906.

The provincial government long ago gave up the hunt for Gun-Noot after it had spent over \$50,000 trying to capture him. For 13 years Gun-Noot has lived and even prospered in the wilderness of the northern section of the province.
