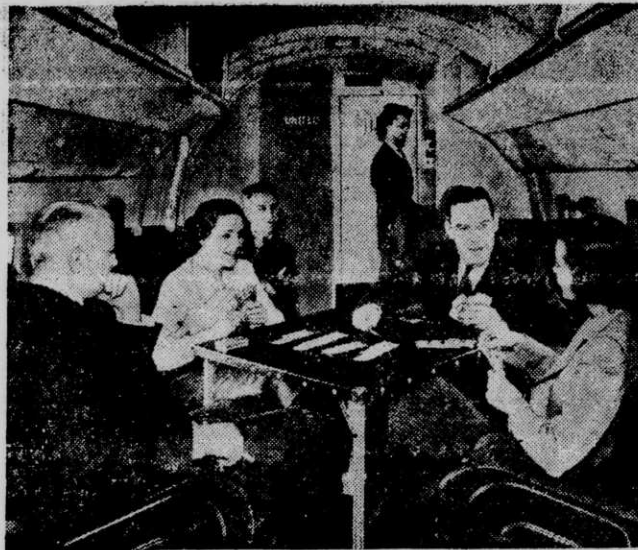
African Adopts Britain

Labor Relations Board

Hits Remington-Rand

REMINGTON RAND, INC., large manufacturer of office equipment, was accused by the federal labor relations board of violating the Wagner-Connelly act and of using "ruthless" methods in trying to break the strike of 6,000 workers in six of its plants. The corporation was ordered to cease alleged interference with union activities of its employes; to bargain collectively with a majority of its workers; to reinstate strikers without discrimination and to withdraw support of so-called "company unions" in its Iliou, N. Y., and Middleton, Conn., plants.

The labor board declared the corporation "exhibited a callous, imperturbable disregard of the rights of its employes that is medieval in its assumption of power over the lives of men and shocking in its concept of the status of the modern industrial worker."

Magistrates Trained

To keep district magistrates up-to-date in administrative methods, the Chinese government brings these minor officials to Nanking once a year for a course in the magistrates' training school.
