### CLEAN UP NOTICE

All premises, lots, yards and alleys must without delay be cleaned of all garbage, refuse and rubbish. Ashes must be removed. Manure accumulations must be thoroughly cleaned up and thereafter through the summer be removed not less than once a week and hauled to the city dump or deposited at such places as the City Engineer may designate.

From this date throughout the summer garbage of all kinds should be burned and destroyed daily. If placed outside for removal it must be put in receptacles fitted with fly-proof or tight-fitting covers. The throwing of garbage on the ground or in uncovered receptacles exposed to flies, etc., will not be tolerated.

In houses not furnished with sewer connections, the outside vaults must be cared for in the following manner prescribed by the State Board of Health:

All cess pools, vaults and water closets must be cleaned once in each year, between the months of May and October, and such other times as the City, County or State health officers shall direct.

No cess pool, vault or water closet shall be located within one hundred feet of any well or cistern.

A strict observance of these rules will be enforced.
