A STRONG TICKET NAMED.

The Great Falls Democracy Meet and Nominate Five Aldermen.

Jensen, Bridges, Wilderkopf, Clark and Trigg Are the Popular Choice For Aldermen.

An Active and Efficient City Democratic Committee Chosen—Many Democratic Veterans Present.

Charles Wagner presided over the democratic city convention which was held Wednesday evening. Walter M. O'Dwyer was secretary.

The chairman opened the proceedings briefly.

Mr. Cockhill then said: There seems to be a strong sentiment in favor of endorsing for mayor Arthur E. Dickerman, who is a young man that has the interests of the city at heart. I don't believe we could improve on him. There is much reluctance to get the majority in to a bitter fight, especially as Mr. Dickerman has all the qualifications for a good mayor.

The chair put the motion, which was carried.

On motion of Mr. Jerry Collins, the convention took a recess in order that the delegates from each ward might make known their preferences.

At the close of the recess the following reports were submitted and were read by the secretary:

THE FIRST WARD SPEARS.

The members of the First ward with one accord recommend for nomination by the convention Capt. Jensen, who as a gallant soldier, enterprising merchant and public-spirited citizen is well qualified to represent the pioneer ward of the city in the city council. (Signed.) Geo. K. Huy.

JOHN BRIDGES NAMED.

The citizens of the Second ward, as represented in convention assembled, recommend unanimously the nomination of John Bridges for Alderman. (Signed.) A. J. Trigg for the Front.

The democratic representative of the Fourth ward nominate A. J. Trigg for alderman with the fullest confidence he will represent the ward ably and efficiently. (Signed.) W. M. Cockhill.

WILDERKOPF AND CLARK.

We the representatives of the Third ward propose for nomination J. K. Clark for the short term and H. Wilderkopf for the long term who are both well qualified to represent the ward in the city council. (Signed.) H. Nalbach.

The nominations having closed, Judge Hiny moved that the candidates named be nominated by the convention. The motion met with a hearty response and was carried unanimously.

On motion the ward delegates presented names for a city committee, which was formed as follows: First ward, N. Henderson; Second, J. Bridges; Third, E. G. Mackay; Fourth, G. W. Taylor; at large, Charles Wagner.

On motion of Charles Wagner, the committee was declared elected.

The convention then dissolved.

THE CONTRACT HAS BEEN LET.

The New Great Northern Depot Will Soon Be Under Way.

The contract for the Great Northern railroad depot has been let to a St. Paul builder. It might be called the union depot, for the Great Falls & Canada trains may leave there on a regular gauge track.

The new depot will stand nearly opposite the Post office and will be on a metropolitan scale. It will be two stories high and have a spacious covered way for the protection of passengers in rough weather.

The building warehouse will also be a leading feature of the new depot or station as it is built with due regard for durability in the specifications. It will be on a large scale in order to accommodate the growing business of the city.

ANOTHER FIRE AT BENTON.

The Park Stables, Owned by William Rowe Totally Destroyed.

At about 12:30 o'clock Tuesday night a fire broke out in the Park stables at Benton, and in a very short time the entire property was destroyed. The flames attained such headway before the firemen arrived that it was hopeless to attempt anything save to protect adjoining property. The origin of the fire is a mystery.

The River Press gives the following account of the losses: The buildings and sheds, the property of Mr. Wm. Rowe, valued at about \$10,000, were totally destroyed. They were insured for \$4,000, but none of the movable property of animals contained therein were insured. Mr. Rowe also lost two stallions and one colt, valued at \$2,500, besides ten sets of harness and other property of considerable value.

Edward Kelley, the stallion, road cart and harness, valued at \$500 or \$600; Frank Stiles, of New Grass, one span of horses, harness, wagon, and camp outfit, value not given.

M. H. Stearns, of Great Northern survey party, now camped at Fort Conrad, one span of horses, harness, wagon, bedding, etc., value not given.

Lewistown stage line, one horse, cart and harness. James Ross, of Sweet Grass, one horse, cart and harness. Alex. C. Johnson of this city, one platoon, valued at \$300. Joseph E. Lewis of this city, one Jersey cow, \$55.

It will be seen from the above that nine horses, one colt and one cow were burned to death. It was a pitiable and heartrending sight to see the poor, helpless animals destroyed in this manner.
