FORMER SLEUTHS IN COUNTY JAIL

Two Men, Once Railroad Detectives, Charged With Transporting Liquor Unlawfully.

Roy Levagood and A. A. Bartlett, both former railroad detectives, are held at the county jail on charges of transporting liquor unlawfully because the battery in their automobile quit functioning Wednesday when they were within a few blocks of their destination, allegedly with five gallons of moonshine whiskey in their sarge. Attention attracted by the sagging weight of the two suitcases they took from the stalled car caused them to be followed to the rooming house conducted at 401 1/2 Central avenue by Cecil Hayes, where they were replaced under arrest by Officer Pat Finerman and their liquor seized.

Heavy Suitcases Suspected. A J. King of the Woodworth apartments, collector of federal customs, suspected the presence of Canadian whisky when two men, shortly before noon, took two heavily laden suitcases from a stalled car in front of his apartment. He followed the pair as they staggered along with their loads until he met Officer Finerman, who took over the chase. The suitcases were found easily enough at the rooming house, but the men were not in sight. Levagood and Bartlett were pointed out as the owners of the grips and investigation within brought to light five gallon jugs of uncolored moonshine.

U. S. Officer Takes Over Case. At the police station Levagood and Bartlett said they had left the car at Third street and Third avenue north because the batteries were "on the bum," but they denied owning the suitcases or that they had taken them out of the automobile. The case was turned over to E. J. Tait, federal prohibition enforcement officer, who said he would accuse the men of transporting liquor and seize the automobile.

Bartlett's recent activities are not known to the police, but Levagood was recently transferred from the Great Northern's detective department to the position of ice foreman, one of the more desirable minor positions offered by the road in Great Falls.

A small amount of wheat was found within one of the suitcases which suggested to Chief Anderson that the liquor had been recently stored in a granary.

START ROUNDUP FOR Y. M. C. A.

Seventy-five Workers Take Field First Day; Luncheons Served Each Noon.

About 75 men turned out Wednesday for the initial day's work in the Y. M. C. A. campaign for 400 new members which is to continue today (Thursday) and Friday.
