Beginning at a point where the east line of township 37, north, range 45 east, meets the international boundary line between the state of Montana and the Dominion of Canada; thence south along the east line of township 37 north, range 45 E. M. to the northwest corner of said township; thence north along the west line of said township 37 N, range 45 E. M. **WHEN TO WEAN PIGS.**  
At the conference of swine extension workers of United States department of agriculture, held recently in Washington, the question of weaning pigs arose. The discussion brought out the fact that in some parts of the country farmers followed the practice of weaning their pigs at most all ages from five weeks up. The conclusions reached were that for best results pigs should be allowed to nurse the sow for at least 10 weeks where it is possible to do so. It was decided that it would be still better to allow the pigs to wean themselves. A good suckling sow properly fed should be in a good flow of milk up to the time the pigs are at least ten weeks of age. Without question the mother's milk is the best feed possible to obtain for young pigs. Consequently hog growers should take advantage of this natural feed to the greatest extent possible.
