## Red Cross Campaign

Red Cross seals were first put on the market in 1907 in the single state of Delaware. The movement has since spread over the entire country, and over \$3,000,000 has been raised from the sale of seals while hundreds of associations have been formed which are fighting tuberculosis in nearly every state and territory. Facts about tuberculosis have been published; helpful laws have been passed; hospitals dispensaries, open air schools and visiting nurses have been established, suffering has been relieved and lives have been saved as a result of the sale of Xmas Red Cross Seals. The educational influence of the Xmas seals campaign has been as much responsible for this as the money derived; every effort of the volunteer to call attention to the seals, even if no sale is made; every display of seals; every sermon; every health talk elicited by the seals has counted in educating the community to guard against tuberculosis.

None of us can afford to be indifferent to tuberculosis. In the first place, you do not know whether or not you may have the disease, for statistics show that 90 per cent of us who appear to be healthy are carrying about tuberculosis scars on our lungs or else latent infection and again indifference may mean not only your own personal health, money and happiness, but it may mean incalculable loss to your own family and your associates, for the fact that someone has it is a menace to the health of those most dear to you. For from one to five infections come.

In the war abroad the Red Cross ministers to the wounded; we wage a war in which Red Cross Xmas Seals bring relief to the suffering and dying as well as defense against the enemy itself. This enemy, tuberculosis, is more deadly than an armed foe, claiming one death out of 1-3 of all who die between the ages of 12 and 45, and costing us over \$500,000,000 a year in loss of life and labor. Will you not enlist in the campaign?

## Governor's Proclamation

Governor Stewart has issued a quarantine to protect Montana livestock from the foot and mouth disease that may come in from Kansas, Nebraska and Missouri. His proclamation follows:

Whereas, the livestock sanitary board of the state of Montana has reason to believe that the disease known as the foot and mouth disease is now prevalent among livestock in certain states of the United States; and

Whereas, the extent of the infection is unknown.

Now, therefore, I, S. V. Stewart, as governor of the state of Montana, and upon recommendation of the livestock sanitary board, do hereby declare and proclaim that all shipments of cattle, sheep, other ruminants and swine from Nebraska, Missouri and Kansas, are hereby prohibited from entering the state of Montana, and all shipments of cattle, sheep, other ruminants and swine into this state from all public stock yards east of Montana, are likewise prohibited.

All stock shipments now actually loaded and enroute, which cannot be diverted, must be held at railroad destination until inspected and released by federal or state veterinarian. This order to take effect immediately.
