BUYING AT HOME EXHIBIT AT FAIR

The Buying at Home exhibit at the Interstate Fair this fall will be unique in that it will be strictly a home manufactured product display. For the first time in the history of the Fair the various manufacturing concerns of the Inland Empire and Spokane will combine in a demonstration of live exhibits showing what they have accomplished. In this display manufacturers from Coeur d'Alene, Moscow, Sandpoint, Lewiston, North Yakima, Wenatchee and other inland points will exhibit. One of the distinctive features of this exhibition will be the Home Product Room, where daintily dressed Inland Empire born maidens will serve various food products to the visitors. This demonstration alone is worth the price of admission to the Fair Grounds. Surrounding this pretty booth you will find displays of home manufactured trunks, grips and packing house products, including local brands of hams, bacon and lard. There will also be beautiful and educational displays of jewelry and electrical fixtures, together with overalls, jumpers, mackinaws, suspenders, shirts, pennants, baseball uniforms, crackers, biscuits, mattresses, macaroni, ditalini, noodles, crocks, jars, pickles, relishes, cider and vinegar. These and many others, with over 200 various kinds of fancy drugs and toilet articles, will be prominently and artistically displayed. The ladies who will have charge of the Flour and Flour Products Department will give daily demonstrations of the best methods of bread and pastry baking. There will be on exhibition woolen goods, including blankets, sweaters and yarns, and in some instances the machines used in turning out these products will be shown. There will be a fine display of lumber and lumber products, together with various building materials, such as sash, doors, paints and oils, shingle stains, cement and cement products. An attractive booth where pretty girls will make the hand rolled toothsome chocolates will be of unusual interest, as they will show the various processes through which this delicious candy passes from the raw material to the finished product.
