The Greatest Naval Feat.

THE great American battleship fleet, after circumnavigating the globe has returned to Hampton Roads. The whole world has been witness to this naval exploit, and all nations have been astonished at the success of the test of the American navy. The sixteen vessels came home in splendid condition ready for a frolic or a fight.

The fleet steamed nearly 45,000 miles or about twice the circumference of the globe, and returns with machinery sound and in order and not an armour plate sprung, proving to the world the high efficiency of the American navy. The cruise of fourteen months, through weather foul and fair, and the return to anchor in seaworthy condition is perhaps the world's greatest naval exploit.

What has been the result of the cruise? Aside from the demonstration of the effectiveness of our battleships, the officers and men have gained a wealth of experience in naval maneuvering and target practice. But greater far than the demonstration of naval power, was the benefit derived from the spreading around the world of the good will of America. At all the great naval ports the fleet was accorded the most royal reception. Friendship was displayed on a scale that has never been reached before. History will record this feat as one of the world's great triumphs of peace.

APPARENTLY well grounded complaint is made that large sums of money subscribed for the Italian earthquake sufferers has been misappropriated having gone into the pockets of dishonest officials instead of being applied to relieve the unfortunate victims.
