State Crop Forecast Well Above Average

WHILE THE USDA forecast that the nation's 1951 "drouth-hampered" wheat crop would fall short of the government goals, it estimated the Montana crop as well above average. The total spring and winter wheat production for the state is forecast at 97,296,000 bushels, compared to 93,858,000 last year and a 10-year average of 67,745,000. Winter wheat yield is estimated at 28,776,000 bushels. Production last year was 25,212,000.

Production for the nation is estimated at 1,053,825,000. The government's goal was 1,150,000,000 bushels.

This estimate, the first of the year for the combined winter and spring crops, is 27,070,000 bushels more than 1,026,755,000 harvested last year. It compares with an average crop of 1,031,000,000.

Winter wheat was forecast at 705,175,000 bushels. This compares with 682,196,000 predicted a month ago,

750,666,000 produced last year and a 10-year average 758,821,000.

Spring wheat was indicated at 348,650,000 bushels. This estimate—the first of the year—is based largely on a report issued in March on prospective plantings and upon the current condition of the crop. Last year's spring crop was 276,089,000 bushels and the 10-year average, 272,491,000.

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
