## From Amy's Desk

If you object to drip-drying wash-and-wear clothing as impractical, try reducing ironing in one of these two ways:

1. Allow fabrics to go through complete washer cycle, then dry in an automatic tumbler dryer at a medium heat setting. When the garments are dry, tumble without heat for about 10 minutes; remove as soon as tumbling finishes.

2. If you hang clothes to dry, use part of the spin cycle to avoid dripping. To reduce wrinkling, use regular rather than slow speed washing agitation on a two-speed machine. Use a cool rinse, then take clothes from the washer after only about a third of the spin cycle and hang to dry.

Never use water or self-polishing (water emulsion) wax on wood or cork floors. They damage finish and may cause swelling and discoloration. On the other hand, never use a solvent cleaner (naptha base as indicated by the odor) or polishing wax on asphalt tile and some types of rubber tile. They soften the tile, damage the surface and may cause colors to run.

The American Medical Association warns against a danger from carbon monoxide. The traffic police know that many deaths from carbon monoxide occur in the cold weather in cars. If the gas itself doesn't kill, the resulting crash often does. Check your exhaust, muffler and manifold. And always leave at least one window open slightly, even on bitter cold days.

Try French onion soup one of these cold days:

### French Onion Soup

Slice four large onions very thin; cook in a large skillet in butter or margarine until golden brown. Dissolve 6 beef bouillon cubes in 6 cups water. Pour over cooked onions. Add 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Bring to a boil and let simmer about 5 minutes.
