## DIVIDE THE COUNTY

### ROAD DISTRICTS ACTED ON BY THE COMMISSIONERS—BIG HOLE MATTER TAKEN UP.

Anaconda, April 18.—The county commissioners met yesterday to divide the county into road districts, provided for under the new law. Supervisors will probably be named today.

District No. 1 includes all of the roads in the county west of the city of Anaconda to the granite county line on Georgetown flats, near Flint creek.

District No. 2 takes in all of the county highways down Turner Springs creek to the Powell county line.

District No. 3 includes all of the roads south and west of the city of Anaconda to the Big Hole divide.

District No. 4 includes all of the roads in the new part of Deer Lodge county just acquired from Silver Bow county.

A new road up into the Big Hole country will be taken up soon. The residents of that section are very anxious to have the improvement made as soon as possible and the commissioners seem to be of the opinion that it will result in much good to Anaconda as well as to the county at large.
