

NOT A FEDERAL AFFAIR

Registration and Voting Entirely Under State Control.

Kansas City, Oct. 26.—According to a decision by Assistant United States Attorney Draffen, vote repeating at the November election can go on ad infinitum, without the slightest danger of prosecution of offenders by United States authorities.

"I have been unable to find any thing in the statutes authorizing the United States to punish persons for fraudulent registration except section 5,513 of the revised statutes, known as the crimes act. I find this section has been repealed."

"If a man should vote two or three times can he be punished?" Draffen was asked.

"No; not in a United States court."

"Then the government cannot interfere in an election, even where the election of a congressman is involved?"

"According to this construction it cannot."

According to the conclusion reached by Draffen, any person may vote as often as the judge will let him, with the certainty that he will not answer for it before Judge Phillips.

Charles Segar, the man whom Chairman Olsen wanted to have arrested by United States authorities for illegal registration, is to be prosecuted under the state law. He was arraigned this morning before Justice Worthen, and at the request of his attorney, the case was continued until Monday.
