either in cash or merchandise). Many of the districts are contributing special prizes which will be contributed by individuals and organizations within the district to stimulate more interest and boost their standing in the contest. The five highest contestants in the entire county will receive special prizes in addition.

A district chairman will be appointed at each of the points mentioned above to count the tails, ears, and feet, and report the amount to be credited to each boy or girl on the 10th and 25th of each month to the County Agents office where they will be tabulated and results of each contestant and each district published in all county papers.

RULES OF CONTEST

1. Contest opens at once and will run until September.
2. Open to any boy or girl in the county under 21 years of age.
3. Pests are to be trapped, shot, poisoned, or secured in any method that will kill.
4. Contestants must report their exhibits for points before the 10th of 25th of each month.
5. Any contestant found guilty of buying or securing points in any unfair manner or disobeying the rules or spirit of the contest may be disqualified by the executive committee.
6. The executive committee reserve the right to change, amend and interpret the above rules and settle all disputes.

Posters and literature giving the names of the community chairman prizes and other detailed information will be published soon. In the meantime all boys and girls wishing to enter the contest should start at once to save rodent tails, rabbit ears, and magpies and crow feet.
