

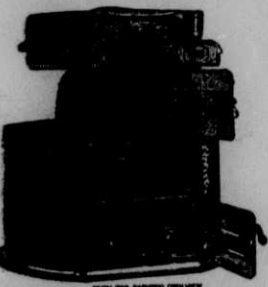

DIXON USING MINES TAX

This is my third letter to you. The first was dated May 1, and the second July 14. Had you replied, this letter might have been of different tone. These letters contained numerous specific indictments against you.

You exercised your privilege—that of silence. To you my charges were too positive, specific and definite. In support thereof confirmatory evidence was too abundant.

Having refused to accept my challenge to debate your official record you found it necessary to sustain your reputation as a debator, to issue a challenge to another. And to serve your questionable purpose, you returned to the first of Shakespeare's seven ages of man, and challenged Judge Erickson.

However, Judge Erickson cannot bat against your curves. He lives too remotely from the state house.

You have had, repeatedly, called to your attention the fact that of the total net earnings of the entire Northern Pacific system, this state yields 55 per cent. That in Montana, where the Northern Pacific makes its money, it pays taxes at the rate of \$900 per mile of road, while outside of Montana this railroad company pays taxes at the rate of \$1,574 per mile of road.

According to the Wisconsin formula, the Northern Pacific is dodging taxes on \$60,000,000 of property in Montana.

The Northern Pacific needs and must have a sniper—an influential one—one who can shed tears when telling sympathetic audiences the story of the abuses suffered by him at the hands of the mining industry of the state—one who can successfully obscure taxation facts by shifting to others a burden that should be partially borne by the Northern Pacific. You are the ideal "sniper."

Had the cost of state government under you been exactly the same as the cost under your predecessor, Stewart, the state today would not owe a dollar. The excess of revenue collected by you, and the cash which you found in funds other than the general fund were equal in amount to the indebtedness on January 1, 1921—the day you assumed charge as governor. From this period of computation it may be stated that the outstanding state indebtedness on July 1, 1924, namely, \$3,595,000, is all of your own creation. Let us have the debate.

What is the secret of the baby's voice production? It seems to be a matter worth serious investigation. In emission of tone the infant unconsciously has a system that makes the Italian appear crude. If singing masters could discover what it is, and teach it, all present methods of vocal study would be revolutionized.
