### TWO TROOPS OF CAVALRY

Wanted by General Merriam in Command at Wardner.

Washington, May 17.—Secretary Alger has received the following telegram from General Merriam in explanation of the situation in the Coeur d'Alenes:

Wardner, Idaho, May 17.—Adjutant General, Washington: The governor of Idaho has carefully reviewed the situation here and deems it necessary to place troops at Burke and Mullan to avoid further disorder. I request two troops of cavalry. Referring to the press criticisms, I have made no order. My action is limited strictly to the support of the state authorities. There are 395 prisoners still in custody under investigation.

Cavalry Will Be Furnished.

Washington, May 17.—The war department is satisfied with the dispatch of General Merriam, and the belief is expressed that he has only assisted the governor of Idaho, and that the military will not be used for any other purpose than that for which it was sent to the disturbed regions.

The troops of cavalry requested by General Merriam will be sent from Fort Meade, S. D., and Fort Robinson, Neb. Several troops of the First cavalry are stationed at these points.

### TWO INSANE MONTANA SOLDIERS.

It Is Believed, However, That They Will Soon Recover.

San Francisco, May 17.—Four insane soldiers who have been at the Presidio post hospital were sent tonight in charge of a guard to Washington, where they will be placed in the government asylum for insane soldiers. These men came in from Manila on the Grant and Sherman about two weeks ago, but were held in quarantine with other passengers from these transports at Angel island until last night. Two of them are privates in the First Montana infantry. Their names are withheld by the surgeon in charge, as they all have good chance of recovery. These men showed no simpleness or madness previous to their Manila service, but were all driven out of their minds by the terrible excitement of war. The terrible and oppressive heat of the Manila climate, coupled with the din and excitement of battle, deprived them of their reason. One of the soldiers is in a stupor and would not be able to find his way about alone in most familiar places. The methods of treatment at the government asylums are so effective that it is expected that all four will recover.
