Uncle Bill Passes

John William Baker was born on October 29, 1871, at Shell Rock, Minn., and passed away January 20, 1948 in Eureka at the age of 76 years, 2 months and 22 days. When a boy at the age of seven years he came West with his parents and a sister, Mrs. J. J. Green who preceded him in death thirteen years ago. His father, William Baker homesteaded in Idaho making their home there until 1902, when he and his mother moved to Montana where he has made his home. He homesteaded in the Tobacco Valley and experienced all of the trials and tribulations of the Pioneers of those days. After his mother's death twenty-five years ago he spent most of his time raising horses, as he was a great lover of horses and spent a large part of his time riding. He helped many of the ranchers with their range stock and was often called "Cowboy Bill." He also did quite a little logging for the Eureka Lumber Company in his younger days. His health has been failing for the past few years. He will be greatly missed by all who knew him. He leaves to mourn his passing, eight nieces and their families, two nephews and their families and a host of friends.

Burial was from the Baptist Church with Rev. Lewno officiating.
