

Hilbird Receives Appointment from Washington, D. C.

Washington, D. C., April 2—W. L. Hilbird, of Libby, Montana, has been appointed instructor of the V. F. W. Junior Rifle Club, it was announced here today by the National Rifle Association as it granted the organization a junior club charter in the NRA's national youth program.

Membership in the new club, which will devote itself to the various phases of target shooting, is open to boys or girls under 18 years of age. Under the able instruction of Mr. Hilbird, the youngsters will learn the fundamentals of rifle shooting and the correct way to handle firearms safely.

Elected officials of the new club are: Raymond H. Remp, president; LaMoine Krighbaum, vice president; Howard D. Madison, executive officer; and Lloyd K. Midyett, secretary-treasurer.

65 DISABLED MONTANA VETS RECEIVE CARS

Helena, — (UP) — The Regional Veterans Administration office at Fort Harrison has announced that 65 disabled Montana veterans have been provided with automobiles at government expense under the "Autos for Amputees" legislation passed by congress in August, 1946. The VA reminded eligible disabled Montana veterans who have not yet applied for the vehicles that June 30, 1948, is the deadline for submitting applications.

NEW STATE REGULATIONS GOVERNING CONSTRUCTION OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS

New regulations governing all future school building construction or remodeling have been drafted by the State Board of Health under an act of the 1947 legislature, according to H. B. Foote, director of the Board's division of sanitary engineering.

The regulations emphasize well-drained school sites, adequate ventilation, lighting, heating, and lavatory facilities, and sanitary water supply and lunch rooms.

BILLINGS VOTES 1200 ADDITIONAL POPULATION

Billings, — (UP) — The Billings City Council has unanimously voted to approve a petition to add 13 subdivisions containing about 1200 people to the city.

The subdivisions, containing approximately 350 to 400 families living for the most part in new homes, includes about 180 acres.

Citizens have three weeks from the date of publication of the notice to protest the addition.

The continental population of wild ducks and geese has apparently hit the bottom of the decline and leveled off, according to the Department of the Interior, which also states: "After analyzing all the data turned in by our observers, it looks as though we have about the same number of birds this year as we had last year. We have been unable to detect any appreciable change either upward or downward in the number of waterfowl."
