Helena—Mule deer head the list of Montana's big game population, according to the State Fish and Game Department. A department spokesman said mule deer numbering an estimated 107,662 account for almost half of the state's

estimated 222,052 big game animals. Other totals include: 38,602 white-tail deer; 31,543 elk; 26,029 antelope; 8,003 black bear; 4,802 mountain goats; 3,664 moose; 1,235 mountain sheep and 692 grizzly bear.

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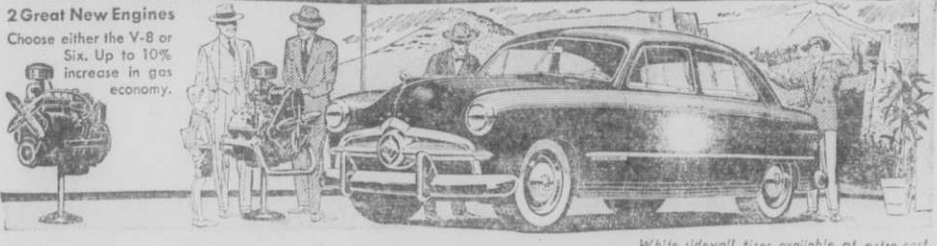
JEFFERSON COUNTY —By A. H. Esleta, Editor Boulder Monitor.

Jefferson county was created January 18, 1895, by the first territorial legislative assembly at El Paso. It became a part of Montana territory, May 26, 1894, and a county of Montana, February 2, 1895, when the first territorial assembly of Montana, at Banck set up the nine original counties. Originally Jefferson embraced about 3,500 square miles, but boundary adjustments by succeeding legislatures diminished its size, and now embraces 1,637 square miles. The seat of government was established at Jefferson City by the act of 1895. About 1869 it was moved to Badersburg and in 1883 to Boulder. The county was named for Thomas Jefferson, third president of the United States. The discovery of the Old Bar mines near the mouth of Cataract creek, caused the establishment of Boulder in 1862. During the next two or three years, further gold discoveries caused the establishment of Montana City, Whitehall, Chancy, Comet and Wickes. The present population is nearly 5,000, and the principal industries are mining, stockraising and farming. And within its borders are three natural hot springs. Three railroads run through the county.

Granite County was founded in 1893, and was a part of Powell, Deer Lodge and Silver Bow counties. The area of the county is 1,178 square miles, and has a population of 3,392. It is located in the beautiful Flint Creek and Beek Creek valleys, where stock raising and mining are the principal industries. Phillipsburg is the county seat.
