**ROOSEVELT COUNTY** —By Mike M. Vukelich, Publisher Wolf Point Herald-News.

This rich wheat raising county was first introduced to the white man when Lewis and Clark entered Montana along the southern border of present Roosevelt county on April 27, 1805. Twenty-five years later the American Fur company moved in to corner the fur trade.

In 1878, during an unusual Indian hunting season, hundreds of gray wolf pelts were piled where the river streamers tied up to take on wood. The landing was dubbed "wolf point" and resulted in the name of the present county seat, Wolf Point, an incorporated city of 2,500.

Roosevelt county's 18,000 residents make their living in wheat and cattle ranching, holding title as one of the largest wheat shipping centers in the nation. It is within the boundaries of Fort Peck Indian reservation, home land of the Assiniboine.

**LIBERTY COUNTY** —By Darby O'Brien, Co-Editor Chester Times.

Liberty county (population 2,209) was founded January 1, 1920, so named because it was the first county to be formed following World War I. Approximately 162 square miles were taken from Chouteau county and the remainder from Hill county. Chester, the county seat, is the only incorporated town in the county and serves a vast area.

Liberty county has some of the best high protein country in the United States and markets approximately 2,000,000 bushels each year. It is the home of the historic Sweet Grass Hills and, if present plans culminate, the site of the Marias dam and reservoir which will irrigate 120,000 acres in Liberty, Chouteau and Hill counties.
