and girls and local leaders. These Club members represented the various counties of the state and were the winners of county events in judging, demonstrating, etc.

The 4-H Club Congress was made up of agricultural and home economics demonstrations, livestock, and crop judging, meat identifications, clothing, foods and home furnishing judging.

Lincoln County was represented by Sheila McCrory, of the Rocky Range 4-H Club of Libby; Kendall Ward, of the Libby 4-H Garden Club; Glen Helms, of the Border 4-H Club at Eureka; Naomi Mackey and Nancy Clark, of the Tobacco Valley Home Economics Club at Eureka; and Beverly Dickinson, of the Busy Bees 4-H Club at Fortine. The delegation was accompanied by Miss Phyllis Knott, a leader of the Tobacco Valley Home Ec. Club.

The Danish system is used in giving awards. In this system it is recognized that frequently there is little difference in first, second and third place winners, and that there may be several individuals whose judging is good enough to have qualified for first place, second place and third place. The blue ribbon group includes all contestants whose ratings were good enough to merit first place, the red group includes those contestants good enough to qualify for second place, and the white group includes those good enough to qualify for third place. All of Lincoln county's delegates placed. Sheila McCrory, Nancy Clark, and Beverly Dickinson placed in the white ribbon group, and Glen Helms, Kendall Ward, and Naomi Mackey placed in the red ribbon group.

Weed Control This is the best season of the year to use sodium chlorate and borax in the control of perennial weeds such as the Canadian thistle, quack grass, and white top. Three parts of borax and one part of sodium chlorate are mixed together dry. Eight pounds of the mixture are applied per square rod on the weed-infested area. The mixture is commonly called "6-2". These chemicals are carried down into the soil by the fall rains and work upon the roots of the weeds. The chemicals will sterilize the soil for one to two years, and will kill all plant life.

THE DOME PRESENTS "THE STREET WITH NO NAME"

Again tapping the newsworthy topics of the times for another subject in this growing list of semi-documentary pictures, 20th Century-Fox offers "The Street With No Name," a story of the operations of the Federal Bureau of Investigation fighting the new wave of gangsterism which has sprung up since the end of World War II.

Since it is a subject which ideally lends itself to this type of film production it is sure-fire and swift-paced entertainment. Not only is it a picture that will hold the audiences' undivided attention, but one which will receive the full support and endorsement of civic groups combating juvenile delinquency and lawlessness.

Unlike many previous films of similar theme and format, this hits its mark with the force of a bullet. There is none of the artificial heroics or dramatics which Hollywood has long considered a vital part of such pictures. Here FBI agents are shown only as efficient operators with a job to do, while those of the criminal element are not the usual bullet-scarred prohibition - day thugs, but baby-faced punks who have received their education as juvenile delinquents.

NO GROUSE SEASON IN LINCOLN COUNTY

The State Game Commission met last week to set the bird seasons for this fall. Chinese pheasant will be open state-wide from October 31 to November 11, inclusive. There will be a prairie chicken season in certain counties east of the divide, but the grouse season was closed throughout the state. Certain counties have plenty of birds for local hunters but it was feared that should only a few counties be opened the pressure from out of county hunters would prove disastrous for seed stock.

The federal split season on waterfowl opens at noon on October 8, running till one hour before sunset, October 21. The second period opening at Noon November 12, and closes one hour before sunset Nov. 25.

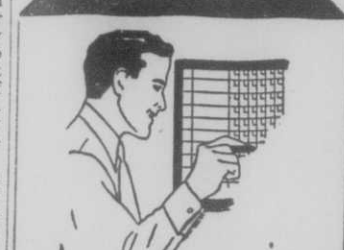
