Care of Paint Brushes
In between coats of paint—if it isn't more than 48 hours—keep brushes suspended in turpentine or mineral spirits. Bristles that rest on the bottom of a container are likely to bend. To prevent bending, drill a hole through the handle of each brush, run a stiff wire through the hole, and rest the ends of the wire on top of the container.
