Unlawful to Possess Wildlife Without a Permit

Deer, elk, antelope, and other big-game animals are now having their young in secluded places in the wild. Mothers of new-born animals care for their young with instinct and intelligence. Persons sighting young animals without seeing the parent often mistake this to be a case of desertion. Animals so found should not be taken home. Invariably the mother will return to her young. Young big-game animals might be excellent pets, when first obtained, but soon become a nuisance, and in some cases are capable of considerable damage. Removal of young animals from the woods is not only unnecessary, but creates many problems for the owner of the pet. This practice is frowned upon to the extent that possession of such animals is unlawful without a permit.

Game-Farm Pheasant Hatching
Each of the state's three game farms reports that young pheasants are beginning to hatch. Incubating the eggs and caring for the delicate young birds is an exacting practice which requires both experience and good luck. The farms at Billings, Warm Springs, and Fort Peck will collectively raise and release about thirty thousand birds this year. Examination in the field reveals that the need for artificially-raised birds might not be great this year. A satisfactory brood stock in the wild seems in evidence. Information is being sought by landowners in certain areas on methods to discourage the Chinese pheasant from uprooting seed corn. Such information has not been asked for several years in the state.

Fishing Season
Opening of the fishing season saw many a new footprint tread into the soft stream banks. Anglers partial to worms did the most business the first week of the new 1949 season. Although high, many streams are not carrying the normal water volume for this time of year. An early lowering of streams and rivers should result in excellent early fishing it is predicted. Unless continued heavy rains keep the stream banks full, it is expected that by midsummer fishermen will need a long line to entice the fish from low clear waters. Less than normal water runoff sometimes means good fishing along with harmful fish depletion.

The Vet's Mail Bag

U. S. Vets Eligible For Canada Benefits N

Many United States residents who served during World War II with the Canadian armed forces have not yet applied for certain benefits available to them, the Canadian Department of Veterans Affairs reports.

The benefits are not new, Canadian government officials point out and are available only to World War II veterans who have not obtained them in the past.

War service gratuity amounts to \$7.50 for each 30 days of service, with an additional 25 cents for each day overseas plus seven days pay and allowances of rank for each six months of overseas duty.

Reestablishment credit consists of \$7.50 for each 30 days of service and 25 cents for each day overseas.

These funds are not given to the veteran directly, the officials state. United States residents entitled to the benefit may use their reest-

ishment credit only for the purchase of veterans' insurance in Canada.

Further information or applications may be obtained from the Canadian Department of Veterans Affairs, Ottawa, Canada.
