## Know MONTANA... Names... Places

### GLENDIVE—By Cy Davis, Dawson County Review

Glendive, city of 5,000 and county seat of Dawson county, located on the Lewis and Clark trail, received its name from Glendive creek, which was named by the Irish play-boy, Sir George Gore, who passed through the area guided by Jim Bridger in 1854.

The first settlement, Camp Canby, was a military post established in 1873 as a supply depot for an exploring expedition sent out by the government from the Missouri river in the interest of the Northern Pacific railroad. On July 4, 1881, that company laid the rails into town.

A division point and the home of the huge N. P. hospital, Glendive is one of the most thriving towns in the State. Three miles to the south the Bad Lands state park has scenic vistas as beautiful and striking as any in the Treasure State.

### BIG TIMBER—Ray and Lamont Beck, Big Timber Pioneer

Big Timber, Sweet Grass county seat, is a town of 1,600 population in the heart of a great cattle and sheep country. Situated in a "V" formed by the Yellowstone and Boulder Rivers, it is widely known as "the town with good fishing at both ends of Main street."

Its name is derived from Big Timber creek where Captain Clark in 1806 stopped on his historic trip down the Yellowstone and noted the large cottonwoods in the vicinity.

Situated in the valley between the Crazy and Absaroka mountains, Big Timber, with its abundant trees and beautifully kept lawns, is a good example of what can be accomplished in cattle and sheep country with perservice and an ample water supply.
