The children present were given cards to fill out. Any children not present, wishing to sign up, are continued on Page Nine

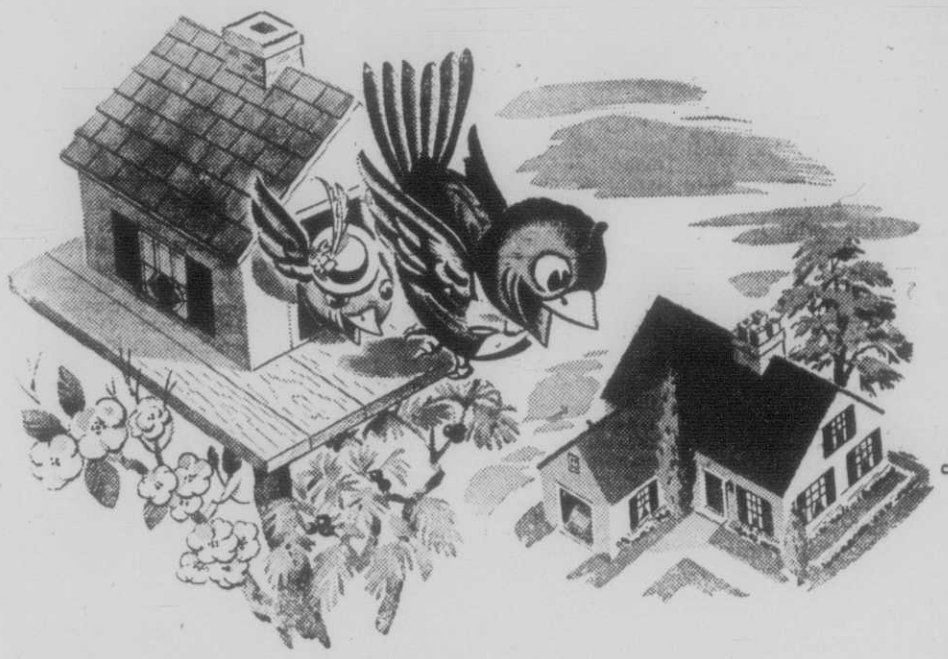
