She was a member of the Church of the United Brethren in Anderson, Ind., where she was active in the many different organizations. Since coming to Troy, she has been affiliated with the Methodist Church but ill health has made it impractical for her to attend church. She has been confined to her home for the past year or more and was bedfast for less than two weeks. Loving hands ministered to her and her memory will be cherished by those in the home.

Mrs. McIntire died May 17, 1946, at the age of 81, leaving the daughter and son-in-law in Troy; three sisters and two brothers in distant states and a host of friends.

The funeral service was held Wednesday afternoon, May 22, in the Troy Methodist Church, with the Reverend E. Roy Fort officiating. Prior to his enlistment he worked as a sheet metal worker at Cutbank, Kalispell and Shelby, Mont., and at Kodiak, Alaska and Bremerton, Wash.

He was a member of Sheet Metal Union Local 99, Ballard Aerie 172, and Fort Lawton Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.
