State Survey May Reduce Milk Price

The state milk control board has ordered a statewide survey to determine the possibility of reducing the price of milk sold by retail food stores.

The survey was ordered after the board denied the petitions of Safeway Stores Inc. and Sawyer Stores, Inc., for a price differential on milk sold by cash and carry stores.

The board said the petitions were denied because sufficient surveys and analysis of distribution costs had not been presented by either proponents or opponents of the price differential and added that the demarcation of a so-called cash and carry store from other stores was not definite.

The board pointed out that a store differential established without adequate knowledge of distribution costs might be in violation of the unfair practices act.

Republican Senatorial Nominee Zales N. Ecton has gone on record as opposed to a Missouri Valley
