Veteran Trainees Must Submit Wage Reports
Some 4,000 of the first 13,500 Northwest vets who were mailed earning report forms have failed to report and face suspension of subsistence this month, the Veterans Administration warns.

All veterans in G. I. Bill training will be required to submit wage report forms every four months so that subsistence payments may be adjusted to meet the requirements of the \$175-200 income ceilings established by Congress.

Veterans who have not yet received the forms are being cautioned that they are forthcoming and that a deadline will be set for return.

Vet Buys Town With G. I. Loan Guarantee
Tucked in the heart of Idaho's primitive area, the little town of Dixie is awakening from a 40-year sleep.

Ghost of a gold rush of 1864, Dixie is in for a face lifting. Earl Thomas Scott, ex-marine has bought the town. When he was turned down on his loan application to purchase a placer claim, the veterans administration appraiser suggested he select property with buildings or improvements to be offered as security.

Scott's purchase includes a 153-acre site, several hydraulic and placer claims, an eight-room hotel, post office, general store and gas pump, a vacant saloon, a one-room schoolhouse, a seven-grave cemetery and several vacant log buildings.

Scott plans to turn the town into a dude ranch and hunting resort with its own private airfield.

Q—I am a World War II veteran requesting a school course that requires three hours per week. Am I entitled to receive subsistence allowance under the G. I. Bill?

A—if you are taking an undergraduate course at a college or university you are eligible for one-quarter of the full subsistence allowance, but if it is a high school or vocational school course of less than six hours per week, you are not eligible for subsistence allowance.

LIBERALIZE VETS' LIFE INSURANCE
Legislation further liberalizing National Service Life Insurance will have a bearing on approximately 70,000 Montana World War II veterans announced Earl V. Lawlor, Veterans Administration contact representative in Kalispell.

NSLI term policies may again be reinstated regardless of the time of lapse upon the payment of two monthly premiums if the health of the policy holder is as good as at the date of lapse.

Under new features added by the 80th Congress a veteran may apply directly for permanent plans of NSLI without previously holding term insurance. Previously veterans were required to carry term insurance for one year before conversion to permanent plans was permissible.

The new act also provides, in certain cases, for automatic conversion of term insurance to a permanent plan for policy holders who are on a waiver of premium status at the end of the term period. Formerly, if they failed to convert with-

in the term period, their insurance protection ceased.
All NSLI policies provides for a waiver of premium after the sixth consecutive month of total disability. Even though premiums are being waived, the veteran may convert to permanent insurance, except the endowment plans. Premiums will be waived during continuance of the total disability.

RAY MONROE GRADUATES FROM MECHANICS COURSE
Keesler Field, Miss.—Pfc Raymond P. Munro, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Thompson, Libby, recently was graduated from one of the world's greatest educational programs—one of the Air Training Commands airplane mechanics training courses at Keesler Field.

The training he received in the mechanics school covered basic airplane and engine mechanic operations. The technical course extended over a period of approximately 16 weeks and included instruction in aircraft electrical systems, engine operation; fuel and oil systems, propellers, structures, instruments and basic inspection. This qualified him for additional specialized

training in the maintenance of heavy bombers, cargo planes, jet and rotor aircraft.
