June 16, 1947 for all live timber marked or designated for cutting and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 150 acres within Sections 3 and 4, T. 36 N., R. 25 W., MPM Stahl Creek, Kootenai National Forest, Montana, estimated to be 270 M feet of live white pine, 720 M feet dead white pine, 570 M feet live spruce, 140 M feet dead spruce, 35 M feet live larch, 90 M feet live Douglas-fir. No bid of less than \$7.00 per M feet for live white pine, \$3.00 for dead white pine, \$3.00 for live spruce, \$1.00 for dead spruce and \$1.50 for live larch and Douglas-fir will be considered.
