Doctors Cause Postponement of Conference With His Lawyers for Week.

Philadelphia, Jan. 17.—Physicians at the hospital where Harry K. Thaw, who attempted to kill himself here last week by slashing himself with a razor, is a patient, said today that Thaw was not recovering as rapidly as had been expected.

Dr. Elwood R. Kirby, Thaw's physician, said early today that his patient was still in a stupor. "He doesn't seem to realize where he is or what has happened," said Dr. Kirby. "His mind is not showing improvement as we expected."

Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw said she probably would issue a statement during the day outlining the stand she will take in the impending legal proceedings against her son.

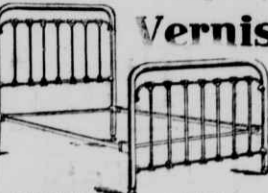
